HIGH SCHOOL and earlier: Maintain a strong grade point average (GPA); develop exceptional habits like reading, note-taking, studying. Ask for additional help, finish all assigned work on time, and meet with your school counselor every 2-3 months. Organization is very important. Start a list of your awards, honors, paid and volunteer work, and extracurricular activities; update throughout high school.

Consider taking the Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualify Test (PSAT/NMSQT). Students who take the PSAT/NMSQT can apply to programs which offer over \$235 million annually in scholarships to qualified low-income and minority students. The PSAT/NMSQT is the qualifying test for the National Merit Scholarship Program, an academic competition for recognition and school. You must take this test to qualify for scholarships and programs associated with the National Merit Scholarship Program.

Attend college fairs and take the SAT or the ACT college entrance examinations in Spring semester of Junior year through the Fall semester of Senior year. 99% of schools accept either test. Consider taking a test prep course.

Early and routine college decision timelines typically occur in August and December. Start applying for scholarships and grants in the Fall semester and throughout your senior year. Scholarship funds are allocated during the fall semester of the preceding year.

Enroll in a legal mentoring program which will help you meet attorneys and judges; learn more about the legal profession and its varied practice areas; education, medicine, corporate and business, technology, media, etc. You'll be surprised. It's called "networking".

Find out what an "Elevator Speech" is — and use it at every opportunity.

Find a mentor who will support and encourage you, provide personalized insight into the legal profession, and generate valuable networking opportunities for you.
